The Orthodox church honors and venerates the Virgin Mary as "More honorable than the Cherubim and more glorious without compare than the Seraphim". Remembering Her in prayers, reflecting on her core values and exemplifying her virtues are significant components of Orthodox Spirituality and Faith. The place given to Her in Holy Qurbana and the Canonical prayers are unique and unparalleled. The Church has dedicated many festivals in hour of Virgin Mary. Some of the important festivals are Festival of Seeds (15th January), Festival of Harvest (15th May), Annunciation (25th March), Veneration of the Mother (26th December), and Assumption (15th August). The 15-day period before the feast of Assumption is a time of fasting and abstinence. Many of the faithful observe lent during




the eight-day period related to the birth of Virgin Mary (1 - 8 September), even though it is not a canonical fast.

Remembering Malankara Sabha Guru Ratnam Fr. Dr. T. J. Joshua

The Malankara Orthodox Syrian Church mourned the passing away of Rev. Fr. Dr. T. J. Joshua (known as Joshua

Achen) on 20th July 2024. The senior priest was a renowned theologian, author, orator, social worker and an exceptional interpreter of the Holy Bible. Fr. Joshua held many prominent positions for the Church during his illustrious career spanning seven decades in priesthood, such as vice-principal and acting principal of the Kottayam Orthodox Seminary (Pazhaya Seminary), distinguished member of the Malankara Orthodox Church Working Committee, founding director to both the Divyabodhanam and Seminary Parish Mission program and Director of the Sruthi School of Liturgical Music.

Fr. Joshua's contributions to the church were unparallel, serving at the

Pazhaya Seminary for more than five decades and teaching numerous clergy members, including the previous and present Bava Thirumeni. A divine gift to the Church, Fr. Joshua was a scholar in New Testament, Old Testament, counselling and his ability to dissect complex theological concepts with simplicity were acknowledged by all his students. Fr. Joshua touched the hearts of Malayalis through his widely acclaimed column "Innathe Chinthavishayam" which he wrote for 33 years, from 1990. The Holy Church

honoured Fr. Joshua with the title "Malankara Sabha Guru Ratnam" in 2016, having published close to 70 books and taught around 1500 priests (including all the present Metropolitans). Fr. Joshua's knowledge, humility, and loyalty to the Malankara Orthodox Syrian Church were exemplary and his legacy will continue to inspire future generations. May the Almighty receive him in heavenly glories.

The Great Schism

A schism refers to the splitting of the Church into two separate groups over differences in beliefs. Over the years, there have been multiple major schisms in the church; the most monumental schism being the Great Schism of 1054. It split the Orthodox church in the East from the Roman Catholic church in the West and was fuelled by theological, cultural and linguistic differences.



In the 3rd century, the Roman empire was growing too large and difficult to manage.

So Emperor Diocletian decided that the Empire should be split into two distinct domains- the Western Roman Empire and Eastern Roman Empire. One of the foundations for the separation between the two empires was the language difference, as the Western Empire spoke predominantly in Latin and the East spoke mostly in Greek which caused division.

A main disagreement between the sides was the Catholic Pope's claim to papal infallibility- a dogma of the Catholic church that when the Pope spoke from the Throne of St Peter he would not make any error in his claims as God would guide him, and so he could make firm statements concerning Church liturgy. The Eastern Church agreed to respect and honour the pope, but believed that matters to do with the Church and its faith should be decided by a council of bishops rather than just one man.

At the heart of the split was the filioque clause, which focuses on the Trinity doctrine and whether the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father alone or the Father and Jesus Christ. Originally, the Nicene Creed stated that the Holy Spirit proceeded from the Father. But the Western Church added the filioque clause to the Nicene Creed which implied that the Holy Spirit proceeded from the Father and the Son. The Eastern Church wanted to preserve the original version,

Both sides persevered and as the disagreement started to heat up, the theological beliefs between the two Churches were more apparent. Both churches claimed to be the true Church of God and the other Church an imposter. This led to the two churches excommunicating each other and the two sides going their separate ways.

Although we have differences with other churches and denomina-

tions, we should look past the differences and instead focus on the common denominator, our Lord Jesus Christ. We all believe that God loved us so much that he sent his only begotten son to die on the cross for our salvation (John 3:16). We also believe that Jesus thought of each and every one of us on the cross. So we shouldn't be arguing with our brothers and sisters in Christ over who is more righteous or who is walking down the right path. Instead, we should unite and show God's unconditional love through our actions as the Church and body of Christ.

Verses to help you in different stages of your life

1 Peter 4:16- "However, if you suffer because you are a Christian, don't be ashamed of it, but thank God that you bear Christ's name."
